Change and the lota Lodge *How the Lodge has Changed with Each Generation*

Our Iota Lodge is 72 years old! Women and time have changed social life at Kenyon. And over its life, Iota Alumni oversight of the Lodge has been hit or miss as older brothers passed on and few replacements lived nearby. Use of the Lodge has also changed with each generation as Kenyon

changed, but for many of us old-timers the Lodge was not used that much. Now its use is constant and it has become inadequate as well as in need of substantial repair and renovation.

The Iota Association had prepared a major campaign and mailing to launch a fundraising drive to upgrade our Lodge, restore

FUNDRAISING UPDATE

Why Put the Horse Before the Cart?

As mentioned on page 1, we are looking to undergo a capital fundraising effort to renovate and modernize the Lodge. Our current strategy is to raise the money and commence work so that by the time of Iota's reinstatement at Kenyon, the Lodge would be ready – or nearly so. This would vastly help our chances of a successful Rush and an invigorated membership!

The more conservative approach would be to get the Iota Chapter back on campus first. The flaw in this strategy is one of reality. extent of needed work on the Lodge in every category is such that it would be considered a construction site by Ohio statute and would thus be fenced off and off-limits to the public, or the Chapter, until the Certificate of Occupancy is issued by the state. The only exceptions would be periodic inspection visits monitored by the contractor.

Many of us have warm and fuzzy memories of the Lodge (which is evident on page 4 of this newsletter). However, like it or not, starting with the wiring and going through the whole structure, the modern Building Codes see it differently. Once work began, all practicable issues would need to be reconciled to code.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

Class of '41 Alum Remembers Freshman Fire

Thanks to Harold Wilder '41 for submitting the following...

Back in the '30s it was custom for the freshman class to build a huge bonfire to celebrate Homecoming Weekend in late October. It was also custom for the freshmen to sneak out and steal the combustibles.

In the fall of 1937, I was one of a few Psi U freshman pledges who joined the group planning the event. There were a few Alpha Delts, some Dekes, Betas and Delts involved, but our bunch was most numerous and so we took the lead. As I remember, our delegation was composed of John Tehan, Jim Hunter, Rudy Ahrens, Bill Davis and me.

Somebody suggested we depart from custom and actually ask for burnable materials. We tried it, and it worked. The townies were shocked, but obviously pleased. They cooperated with enthusiasm and imagination. I remember one fellow offered 24 8 x 8 bridge ties that were lying in his backyard, then offered the use of his truck to transport them and other "stuff."

In town (Mt. Vernon), a builder was in the process of remodeling a tavern that had been known as "The Log Cabin," I believe. Lining the inside walls had been some 8 or 10 "barkon" logs about 20 feet long. With a different decor in mind, the logs were useless to him. He actually helped us cut them in half, then load them onto the truck.

The lumberyard had a huge pile of slashtrimmings and broken junk lumber. That made a truckload by itself.

We gathered all this and more at the "Y" in the path in front of Old Kenyon and started to build.

We made an octagon of bridge ties. Since the ties were 10 feet long, so were the sides of the hexagon. We stood the 10-inch logs on end in the corners. The longer slash pieces were nailed to the logs to secure them and create an enclosure for all the short stuff.

We finished all this sometime Thursday evening, then posted an all-night watch to keep rascals from starting the fire early.

Friday evening Homecoming festivities began! Alumni were all about. We had a bit of trouble getting a fire started, but when at last it was burning - WOW! What a fire! It actually was still smoldering late Sunday afternoon. But Friday night was nearly disaster. Somebody discovered that the varnish on the window trim in the Old Kenyon dormitory was smoking! The Gambler Volunteer firemen came and hosed it (Old Kenyon) down, and cooled off our fire, but let it continue with less fury.

For the rest of my four years, there was no Freshman Fire at Homecoming. Then, of course, we had this war, and I don't know if the tradition was ever revived.
